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## **Course Description**

This course provides an overview of the authors, books, genres, storyline, and theology of the New Testament. Students will be equipped and challenged to correctly interpret and apply the New Testament to life and ministry.

# **Student Learning Objectives**



- 1. Students should be able to utilize a deeper knowledge of the authors, books, genres, storyline, and theology of the New Testament in order to form a biblical vision for life and local church ministry.
- 2. Students should be able to more faithfully interpret the original meaning of the New Testament text for teaching and discipleship.
- **3.** Students should be able to utilize a working knowledge of the historical background and theology of the New Testament in order to faithfully apply Scripture to every area of life.
- 4. Students should be able to faithfully study and meditate on the New Testament in order to grow in their love for God, their likeness to Christ, and their passion to reach the nations with the gospel.

# **Course Texts**

I will be using the English Standard Version (ESV) of the Bible throughout this course.

### **Course Requirements**

- Attendance: Students are expected to be present when class begins and to remain the entire class session each week of the course. That being said, life happens! We totally get it. However, communication is key—if something comes up, please let us know. In order to earn credit toward a certificate, students must not miss more than two class sessions per course. We know we are asking a lot, but that's because we take your theological, spiritual, and ministry formation seriously!
- **Reading:** Students will read through the assigned sections of Scripture and *The Lion and the Lamb* **before class each week** in order to gain an introductory knowledge of the session topics and to participate in discussions. I would encourage you to break up your reading into "big" reading and "small" reading sessions. In other words, set aside larger chunks of time in the morning or evening to complete the bulk of your reading, but also use smaller windows of time (i.e. while your oil is being changed, sitting at your kid's soccer practice, nap time for little ones, or a few minutes during your lunch break) to complete the rest.
- Assessments: Students will take 3 online, multiple-choice assessments throughout the course. These assessments are designed to help students recall what they have learned and assist instructors in constructing future courses... don't freak out about these! Because this is a certificate program, you



won't be assigned a grade. By completing the assessments, you will fulfill the requirements for the course. View each assessment as a memory challenge, not a grade.

### **Course Policies and Procedures**

• **Technology Policy:** Students are allowed to use computers in class for the sake of taking notes. However, students are not permitted to use their computers, phones, or other devices to record audio or video of class sessions without the instructor's written permission.
